

A quick guide to stand numbers at Eurobike

It's easy to find an exhibitor located in one of the main A or B halls. But where are E1, FG, FW and ZH? E1 is a temporary hall in the outdoor grounds between halls A5 and B3. The open air grounds are divided into FG (Freigelände = open ground area west) and FGO (Freigelände Ost = open ground area east). For example, if you are looking for Karbon Kinetics, you'll find the stand number FG-0121 – which means they are located at Freigelände East, stand number 121. FW and FO stand for "Foyer West" and "Foyer Ost" (= Foyer East). ZH stands for "Zeppelin Hall" which houses mainly e-bike suppliers as well as an e-bike test track. COVER: Messe FN

Ideal takes minority share in Ridley

Ridley comes into Eurobike with a new wind at its back. Belgian investment company LRM and the Ideal Bike Corp., Taiwan's third-largest bike producer, became minority investors in the premium Belgian brand.

"For us, Ideal is a great partner," CEO Jochim Aerts said yesterday. "All of our bikes for the markets outside of Europe are already assembled by Ideal. But where we see a major benefit is from supply chain and purchase, not to mention distribution. The plan is to distribute Ridley in Asia through the existing Ideal network."

Ridley is owned by Race Productions NV. The company has been seeking

investors since the Kemper family, which had owned a 50 percent share of the company since 2004, pulled out earlier this year.

Aerts said he sought new partners who "shared the cycling passion with us."

He said Ideal now owns 25 percent of Race Productions and LRM 5 percent, while he maintains control of the company with a 70 percent share.

The investment should help Ridley broaden its product range and boost its global distribution.

"This is one of the major goals of this recapitalization. We will increase our product range one day to mountain bikes," Aerts said. The Ridley brand currently offers about 10 carbon and five aluminum road and

No recreational products are on Ridley's radar, however. "Ridley will always be a sportive competition brand," said Rik Vanhoof, commercial project coordinator.

With the investment from Ideal, Ridley becomes a cousin of Advanced Sports International, the U.S. company that owns the Fuji and Breezer brands, among others. Ideal is also a minority owner of ASI.

But Aerts said there are no plans at present to form a closer partnership

"This wasn't on the table now. It's too early to give any details," Aerts said. "Nevertheless we have to see what collaborations might fit. The fact is, at the present time Ridley sells direct to the U.S.A."

Aerts founded Race Productions in 1990 by building and painting custom frames for local brands. He later launched the Ridley brand, which is now the market leader in Belgium. Ridley is based in Paal-Beringen, Belgium. JB

Goal Zero energizes folding solar panels

A first-time exhibitor is trying to generate some buzz for its powergenerating solar products.

Goal Zero is showing easy-to-use, portable solar panels for owners of conventional and electric bikes.

"We are eyeing e-bikers and travel bikers, because we can charge or power almost any USB product from the sun," said Philipp Tenuis, European marketing manager for the U.S. company.

"With our solar generator kit, the Yeti 400, you can easily charge your e-bike. And if you have the right number of solar panels, you can charge the Yeti after a day of sunshine," he added. "Keep the panel with the Yeti at your campsite while riding and charge your bike when you get

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Men in kilts showcase six bonny bike brands

Italy has a huge one. Taiwan has had one since year zero. Japan has had one since 2003. Now, Scotland has one too — a pavilion at Eurobike. Or, at least, a booth.

"We're starting small but we aim to get bigger," Gordon Todd, a senior executive with Scottish Enterprise, said yesterday. Scottish Enterprise is an agency of the Scottish Government.

Scotland isn't just a world-class mountain biking destination, it's also an incubator of bike brands. Six of them, all Eurobike debutants, are represented at

"We walked the show last year and were determined to get a space," said Graeme McLean, MTB project manager for Scottish Cycling, the governing body for cycle sport in Scotland. "Endura [the Scottish apparel company] is a great role model for us. Our stand is a platform for smaller brands, but brands which want to grow like Endura. We want to showcase Scotland's bicycle businesses."

The stand - topped with a saltire,

the blue-and-white Scottish flag – was bathed in sunshine yesterday at Eurobike.

Dotted around the tent-shaped stand are representatives from Free Flow Technologies, an electric bike brand, and Launch Components, a gravity MTB brand. Among other trick parts, Launch sells a €270 (\$488) 300g magnesium

Fashion designer Alex Feechan is seeking distributors for Freedom Foxx, her new women's cycle clothing collection.

Tom Durham has developed a modular range of pumptrack parts and is seeking manufacturing partners for his start-up business, Collective Training.

Russell Stout is here representing custom bike builder Shand Cycles. Scottoiler is a long-established

supplies brand with a bicycles division that makes Ultimate Bike Solution, a

new water-based bike lubricant and maintenance spray.

Drop in a business card for a chance to win - what else? – a bottle of single malt Scotch whisky. Naturally, the "Scottish pavilion" also has information on road and mountain biking riding in Scotland.

McLean is based at the Glentress mountain bike center. Scotland's oldest dedicated mountain biking park, which was opened by a private developer in the late 1980s.

"Scotland has a lot going for it," McLean said. "But don't blame us for the rain at the start of the show."

Suspend disbelief with Canyon's road bike conception

Older readers may remember a few attempts in the 1980s to bring nascent mountain-bike suspension technology into road biking, but RockShox at Roubaix didn't last.

With the MRSC Connected concept bike, launched at Eurobike, Canyon is resurrecting the idea. It's road bike suspension, Jim, but not as we know it.

"Our focus is always to make the bike faster, and your body has to do less work if you have a comfortable bike frame. Bumps from the road make the system slower, so it is really about building a

faster bike," said Sebastian Wegerle, Canyon's lead engineer.

Canyon says muscle fatigue caused by bumps and vibration are an overlooked contributor to performance loss. To eliminate this, it placed carbon leaf springs at the front axle and seat stays.

An on-board CPU, from Deutsche Telekom, processes sensor data and relays

stand **B4-404** rheological" fluid bearings. An electric current polarizes metal particles to change the level shock absorption.

The prototype is not slated for production, but Canyon has a good track record of demo-ing ideas that later become common currency - hydraulic road discs and integrated brakes being cases in point. ■ ML

"There's a huge market in Europe," said Steve Domahidy, a founder of Niner Bikes who is a part-owner of Faraday. "We get emails every single day. There's a lot of interest. We're over here trying to start the conversation on how to support the infrastructure to sell over here."

Domahidy said Germany and the UK, along with Amsterdam and Copenhagen, are priorities. Faraday intends to sell through IBDs, but wants to ensure it has a customer service structure in place

The Faraday Porteur has a custom lithium battery that fits inconspicuously in the downtube, and a 250-watt motor integrated into the front hub. On first sight, your eyes make a beeline to

the bike's clean lines and colorcoordinated accessories,

instead of a bulky battery.

That's on purpose. Adam Vollmer, the Porteur's creator, proposed the bike as an entry to the Oregon Manifest design project in 2011. He was working for IDEO, the famous international design firm.

Vollmer and his team ended up winning the People's Choice Award. He soon left his steady job to see if he could commercialize the Porteur, even though he knew little about the e-bike industry.

Through a successful Kickstarter campaign, Faraday pre-sold 50 bikes at \$3,500 (€2.650) each. He sold another 100 after the campaign ended. Those bikes have been delivered, and the company is now preparing for production in Asia.

The Porteur can travel up to 32 kilometers (20 miles) on one charge. A Gates Carbon Drive belt turns a Shimano Alfine 8 internal-gear hub. Other features include bamboo fenders, a Brooks B17 saddle, removable front rack, disc brakes and integrated lights.

At 18kg (37 lbs), the bike is light enough for riders to pedal the bike without power, heft up stairs or load onto a bus or train.

"A lot of people are using it as an alternative to a Vespa," Domahidy said. "It's a pretty wide demographic. A lot of people buy it for the design and it's a bonus that it's an e-bike."

Ride Onn with polo-inspired helmets from Argentina

Argentina has long been famous for polo players and other equestrians. If Onn has anything to do with it, the country soon will be famous for bike helmets.

Onn is a two-year-old Buenos Aires company that makes eve-catching, equestrian-inspired helmets for the urban market.

"The technology comes less from cycling but from motorcycles," said Miguel Cadeiras, one of the founders. "The outer shell is fiberglass. We were scratching our heads how to make it thinner'

The lids are very light, while meeting all the relevant safety standards. Under the fiberglass there are layers of EPS foam, breathable fabric and washable padding. They are entirely handmade in Argentina. Onn employs eight in addition to its three founders.

Style-wise, the fabric-covered head protectors take much of their inspiration from horse riding — and that's not just the shape.

"You see in horse riding how evervone is really well dressed. Everything that they have should look perfect," Cadeiras said. "We think it's a good thing; we're trying to merge these two worlds."

Onn offers 19 styles in all

For men, this vear's hot design is a tweed-inspired pattern, while last year's was cordurov. For women. a curvy, red polka-dot number has supplanted last year's animal-print

And there's a

Russian Cossackinspired fur hat for women of a certain age.

"We have a big market among older people, because they don't want to wear a race helmet in town or going to the supermarket," Cadeiras said.

Garcia Resta, another founder, said, "Now, with electric bikes, cycling among older people will continue to increase. Our helmets work very well with it."

The Onn founders are envious of Europe's stylish bike culture and the prevalence of cycling for urban transport and convenience. They said cycling is growing in Buenos Aires and across Argentina.

The brand is strong across Benelux, Portugal and Spain, but is looking to expand distribution in the UK, France, Germany and Poland. ■ ML

2015 Apparel: Commuting/urban wear

Commuters won't buy fashion unless it's accompanied by a lot of function

Cyclists everywhere have long understood the point of a good rain jacket, a lightweight top or padded shorts for their daily treks to and from the workplace. Only recently has the concept of "fashion" entered into the discussion about apparel that, above all, has to be serviceable.



Nevertheless, commuting wear that is not purely utilitarian but sits at the hard edge of fashion can be a hard sell. How do companies convince riders that a nicely tailored jacket or a pair of bike-specific jeans are worth a premium to pieces that simply get the job done? Many brands say their clothing works "as well in a café as it does on the bike," but it remains a tough ask. Here are some apparel brands that manage to deliver a fashionable edge in this most functional of categories.



Endura FlipJak

Function junction.

Endura, from Scotland, knows something about clothing that performs in cold, damp and generally grizzly conditions. Yet for years the company somehow under-marketed its expertise.

Its new Urban collection, which offers "office-compatible chic," might change that. The Urban FlipJak Reversible jacket is, the company says, something of a Jekyll and Hyde: Worn one way, the lightweight and insulating jacket has

an in-your-face, hi-vis colorway; turn it inside out and it's an office-friendly discreet black. It features a lightweight, windproof and showerproof shell, Primaloft insulation and has zipped handwarmer and chest pockets.

The trendy Japanese brand **Pedaled** joined forces a few years ago with Brooks, the traditional UK accessories and saddle brand. That's made this niche, high-end brand a lot easier to find in Western retailers. Pedaled's new Saddle Packable Jacket is made in made in Italy from a Nanosphere-coated cotton/nylon mix that resists rain and dirt. Made for spring and fall, the Saddle Packable Jacket is sharply tailored and comes with a carrying sleeve.

Giro's Insulated
Shirt is a 100 percent
DWR-coated reversible
shell with 25g Primaloft
insulation within, and a full zipper and
button closure without — all designed to
look like an overshirt.

"The Men's Insulated Shirt was something Giro designers collectively wanted, but couldn't find anywhere," the company says. "It's a versatile staple that keeps you warm and dry, yet packs down easily for storage."

The Frisco Coat, which is available in both men and women's cuts, takes its cues from military ingenuity. It uses a waterproof dense-weave cotton fabric originally developed to keep a fighter pilot alive in case of an emergency landing at sea. Both styles feature an adjustable reflective hood.

For women there's the Insulated three-quarter legging for spring and fall riding with a Cytech chamois pad; and

the Mobility Cuff Pant, a free-moving garment made from stretch fabric with an elastic cuff.

This is the first year British company

Dare2B has had an
urban range on the
market. For 2015,
it's expanding the
collection to include
jeans, jean shorts and shirts, all with
technical, functional details including
reflectivity and odor-control fabric.

Styling and color combine, the company said, to enable the "fashion conscious to cycle to work safely, work through their day and be ready for any last minute socializing without compromising on style or ability".

For commuters who practice Casual
Friday every day, the German brand

Maloja has expanded
its range of casual
cycling wear, with
new men's and
women's hoodies and T-shirts in its
signature bright pastel colors.

And — here's an

interesting angle—
Ziener says its new
bike shorts are ideal for
lifestyle cyclists ... and for e-bikers. Who
knew that e-bike riders require specific
gear? Given the strength of the German
e-bike market, it might take a German
company to figure out what e-bike riders
need. The loose-fitting shorts have an
inner lining with one of the company's
own pads, which can be removed to
create "sporty leisure trousers."

Totally coconuts. Given the bicycle's deserved reputation as environmentally friendly town transport, it's not surprising that many companies are boosting the green credentials of their togs.

Houston, Texas, specializes in bikewear made from bamboo white ash — an ultra-soft, breathable, thermo-regulating "natural performance fiber." Its Metropolitan Polo is made from recycled polyester blended with up to 55 percent bamboo white ash. It sports a three-button collar and breast pocket and is cut slightly looser than performance jerseys, to allow cyclists to transition seamlessly from commute to office.

Fanfiluca also incorporates natural fibers in its commuter wear. Instead of bamboo, Fanfiluca's commuter shirt uses Cocona, a Polartec product made from activated carbon derived from leftover coconut shells. (Apparently, there are a lot of coconut shells left over by the food, medical and filtration industries.) According to Polartec, the activated carbon creates a moisture-wicking effect, aiding cooling and speeding up drying times.

The most significant "greening" is taking place in waterproofing treatments.

Many manufacturers are moving to PFC-free materials and treatments.

PFCs, or perfluorinated compounds, enhance a material's water and oil repellency and durability without causing it to lose breathability. However, its use comes with significant environmental and health concerns.

For its Officer commuter pant, Fanfiluca uses a Swiss-made fabric that is impregnated with a fluorinefree compound for a more ecological water repellent finish.

B5-402 Gonso is also moving away from PFCs, switching to a polyurethane treatment for its Uwe and Temo all-weather jackets for men, and the corresponding Ulla and Agave versions for women.

Come rain or shine. Rainwear is a big deal for dedicated bicycle commuters, so it's well represented among the apparel brands at Eurobike.

Vaude is showcasing its latest Bike Rain Sympapro jacket. Sympatex is a 100 percent recyclable, **B5-400** PTFE-free membrane that makes up the mid layer of the jacket's three-layer fabric. The jacket also protects against wind while retaining breathability.

The Sympapro also has taped seams and waterproof zips, a fold-out collar, long back and reflective elements, all to keep riders safe and snug in the darkest, wettest downpour. The back pocket holds a few essentials and doubles as a nack sack when needed

Shimano's **Explorer Stretchlite** A1-200 Rain Jacket is light, compact and stretchable, and boasts a cycling cut. Smart details including a Napoleon pocket, cuff adjusters and a drawstring spindle adjuster on the hem. It's also packable and comes in an eye-catching green and blue colorway.

Finally, because keeping your fingers and toes dry is sometimes 90 percent of the battle, the Sealskinz All Weather Cycle Glove is totally waterproof, anti-slip and has a touchscreen-friendly material on the index finger so you can Instagram your commute and keep your digit

It's slightly more bulky than the brand's Dragon Eye glove, but still slim enough not to impede dexterity. The company also makes waterproof socks, and its classically styled 3-panel Waterproof Cycling Cap will keep the rain out of your eyes and a smile on your face. Until you reach the office, at least. ■ ML

Despite selling direct, Poison brings refocused line to show

Poison Bikes is making its debut at Eurobike, but the man behind the brand has been an exhibitor almost since the show began.





Hans Werner Theisen headed the Chaka brand, which sold to IBDs. Now, Poison is focused on selling directly to consumers.

"We stopped exhibiting five or six years ago because in those days, and different from Chaka, the focus of our young and successful second brand, Poison Bikes, has been on direct sales through the Internet," Theisen said.

As Poison had more success with its direct sales model, Chaka moved more and more into making custom bikes. In 2012, however, Chaka's parent company — Bike Trading GmbH — filed for bankruptcy.

Theisen and his team founded Poison and took over all of Chaka's assets.

"Since than we have concentrated on Poison, but now with a completely new approach that we are presenting here at Eurobike," Theisen said.

He said the Poison brand, which had been a sportive bike brand, is refocusing on touring bikes

"This is the field that we, as a small supplier, see as our niche and our main area of competence," Theisen said. "That's the category we want to focus on and grow."

Poison's top long-distance touring bike is the Atropine 28 Randonneur Rohloff Gates 2015.

It's an aluminum-framed, robust beauty that pairs a Rohloff hub with a Gates Carbon Drive belt. Customers can choose between 26-, 28- and 29-inch wheels among several other choices.

Because of the decision to reposition the brand, Theisen said it made sense for Poison to show itself at Eurobike for the first time.

"We have some interesting products to show. To introduce them to the international market we have to show a real presence," he said.

"This is what we are doing at Eurobike, not only on the trade days but also on the consumer day," Theisen added.

Apart from complete bikes, Poison also offers frame kits as well as some sub-assembly services.

"Some customers out there want parts mounted on the new bike they have already bought. We can build up their new bike with the parts they bring in," he said.

While Poison is a premium brand that is sold mainly through its website, www. poison-bikes.de, a few IBDs continue to offer the brand.

But Theisen said Poison would remain focused on direct sales. He said 80 percent of sales currently come from within Germany and the rest from neighboring countries.

Theisen hopes Eurobike will help increase Poison's presence outside of Germany. ■ JB





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Slide2Go seeks OEMs for its new Easy Click mount

For years, industry vet Louis Mühlberger puzzled over how to create an system for mounting bags or baskets to a bicycle that would have "no comparison," as he puts it.

He thinks he accomplished it with the latest Easy Click system for his Slide2Go, which is on display at Eurobike.

"Slide2Go is the only integrated mounting system. It is integrated into the stem or rack of the bicycle, which means it is the perfect match for the OEM bicycle market," Mühlberger said.

As the name implies, the Easy Click system works with a "click."

"The basket or the bag is inserted with the holder into the Slide2Go housing and locks automatically with a click," said Lorna Chen, sales manager for Konnix, which manufactures the system.

Chen and Mühlberger are seeking OEM customers.

"Customers can buy the system, including Easy Click as a stand-alone product, or buy the entire package from Konnix, which comes with bags and baskets," Mühlberger said. "They can even select their own bag and basket collection from the

Konnix collection. From waterproof bags to natural wicker baskets, we have all of them at our here at our booth."

This year, Slide2Go is offering a stem cap solution for electric bicycles.

"It works especially with the Bosch and Shimano e-bike stems," he said. "Simply replace the stem cap and you have a mounting system for all Slide2Go bags and baskets."

He said the Slide2Go mount attaches without interfering with the on-board cycling computers.

Mühlberger is in charge of research, development and testing from his office in Cologne, Germany. Financial support for the Slide2Go comes from Konnix Industry of Taiwan, which oversees production of the system in Taiwan. JB



Lock8 inventors say 'smart lock' makes rentals easier

Two former Oxford students have launched the Lock8, a "smart" bike lock, just in time for Eurobike.

Pronounced like "locate," the Lock8 system is designed for bicycle rental fleets or bike share bikes. Within the lock are GPS and Bluetooth modules. Cyclists can use a smartphone to find a bike equipped with a Lock8, unlock it, and pay for it.

The founders of Lock8, Franz Salzmann and Daniel Zajarias-Fainsod, are offering products for sale at their booth

"We will sell our first 1,000 devices at Eurobike, exclusively to business customers who want to test the system for the 2015 cycling season," they said.

Salzmann, who is CEO of the young company, said the company has received pre-orders from customers in more than 30 countries.

"It has enormous potential and is

the foundation of a worldwide bike rental network," Salzmann said. He said the Lock8 is compatible with 90 percent of all bicycles, making it ideal for bike rental services.

Zajarias-Fainsod said the Lock8 could reshape the global bicycle rental and bike share experience.

"If a person needs a rental bike, they will find Lock8-equipped rental bikes in their proximity using the smartphone app," he said. "Once booked, the bike can be unlocked using the app, and off you go!"

Salzmann added, "This makes bike renting simpler and more flexible than ever before."

The founders, both 28 years old, recently moved their company, Velolock, to Berlin. ■ JB

Innova unleashes its Monsters on the mountain bike market

Many Taiwanese tire producers have made their way into bicycle tires from the car and motorcycle market, but Innova Rubber went the other way around.

Apart from tires for motorcycles and ATVs, bicycle tires are Innova's biggest product group. The range it is showing at Eurobike is a special one because Innova is celebrating its 20th anniversary in the bicycle market.

Its latest innovation is a mountain bike downhill tire range that uses different types of patented plastic studs. Innova also created a new brand. Cyclours, that sells bags and wallets made from recycled inner tubes.

The company recently created a new private label, Innova Pro, for its top-of-the-line aftermarket products.


"With Innova Pro we target the high-end market,"

said Michael Chen, Innova's sales A3-602 and marketing manager. The Innova Pro downhill range, Downhill Monster, walked off with a d&i award at the Taipei Cycle Show earlier this year.

Driving Innova's innovation is its founder and president, Tony Hsieh.

When his R&D team first set out





then we invented a simple machine that now automatically stamps into the tire," Chen said. Even while the team worked to perfect the

metal studs, Hsieh was brainstorming another solution

He found it by creating a variety of spikes, or studs, made from different blends of plastic.

These patented plastic studs are not only lighter than steel or aluminum but can be made in different variations that are tuned to different types of surfaces.

While our classic Monster tire rolls into the market without studs, the Little Monster relies on softer studs and the Big Monster on harder engineered plastic studs," Chen said.

Innova's Monster Tire provides a balance of softness and strength, while shoulder blocks give it good grip, especially on dry ground.

With its softer plastic studs—colored red — the Little Monster tires are intended for semi-wet and dry ground.

The Big Monster, meanwhile, featuring yellow, harder studs, is made for wet, muddy ground and snow.

Chen said mountain bikers can experiment with combining different Monster tires.


"Racers can consider having a mix of Monster and studded Monster tires for the front and rear wheels to handle different levels of wet and dry ground, and find the perfect match for grip and speed," he said.

Meanwhile, Innova's Grace Tsao is promoting the company's Cyclours brand at Eurobike.

"This brand concentrates on bags and wallets made out of recycled and rejected tires and tubes," Tsao said. "For dealers, we also offer a nice display to go with our new Cyclours products. It helps when they put these products in the spotlight." \blacksquare JB

The biggest troublemakers in the industry: low step-through pedelecs

They're unisex, convenient, and they let just about anybody become a cyclist no matter how athletic. They are pedelecs with low step-through frames, and they have become the top sellers on the e-bike market.

Even without knowing exact sales figures, it's easy to see that this style is the No. 1 pedelec on the roads of Germany.

A central tube that curves very low to the ground for an easy step-through makes these bicycles available to broad target groups. That's a welcome development, because it enables people who are overweight or have a disability to start cycling. That's healthy for them and gives them more mobility.

Young mothers can reach the saddle easily and comfortably. When riding with a mounted child seat, they don't have to risk the shaky business of throwing a leg over the top tube, as is the case with conventional frames.

In short, low step-through pedelecs have a lot going for them.

Pedelec physics. Unfortunately, they have a lot going against them, too. No other frame design has seen more recalls than low step-through frames — with or without electric motors. Most of these are made of supposedly reliable aluminum.

There have been many cases of frames breaking, resulting in falls that have sometimes severe consequences.

Products recalled by reputable companies are only the tip of the iceberg. As bicycle experts, we know of many other problematic frames whose problems are being ignored.

Why are these rider-friendly frames at

such high risk of breakage, especially when used as a pedelec?

According to research and from personal experience, riding a pedelec increases a cyclists' average speed by about 5 kmh (3 mph). That doesn't sound like much. does it?

However, this means a typical 250-watt pedelec is constantly traveling with 75 percent more kinetic energy than a conventional bicycle. Impacts and bumps therefore affect pedelecs more severely than regular city bikes.

Other factors contribute to the problem:

- Pedelec riders tackle terrain that is more challenging than they are used to. In other words, pedelecs let cyclists climb mountains that were previously insurmountable to them. The problem isn't going uphill; it's that they eventually have to come back down as well
- Pedelec users do not sit athletically in the saddle, but crash into every bump and rumble over every curb.
- Pedelecs are heavier and therefore under more strain. The electric assist encourages cyclists to carry heavier loads.
- Low step-through frames are not redundant. In other words, if one tube fails, there isn't another tube to hold the bicycle together. The rider falls head first onto the road.
- Pedelec users ride more often, according to research by several

manufacturers.

Taken together, this demonstrates that the potential for damaging a pedelec is significantly higher than for a conventional city or trekking bike.

The e-bike components add to the problem. With the weight of a motor and a rechargeable battery, typical pedelecs with low step-through frames mutate into genuine wobblers.

Inexperienced, less athletic cyclists
— the typical clientele for these kinds
of bikes — fall more because they often
cannot cope with the pedelec's handling.

A wobbly pedelec doesn't necessary unseat its rider like a balky horse. Instead, riders alarmed at their bike's shaking may brake too hard in panic, or ride the brake as they creep down a hill. That can cause the brake to fail, leaving the pedelec totally out of control, and there we go!

Stepping up to the challenge. The good news: It is entirely possible to design stable and durable pedelecs with low step-through frames. To do so, the designer, product manager and testing institute have to treat the pedelec as something other than a conventional trekking or city bike that just happens to have a motor attached.

It does take some effort, but with the help of CAD systems and testing laboratories, safe pedelecs with low step-through frames are possible.

There isn't a simple recipe, such as adding an additional gusset or a welded-in cross tube. It requires the sum of many improvements, such as an adapted frame geometry, optimized tube dimensions, sophisticated welding procedures with thermal finishing treatments, a solid mounting of the bicycle rack, and functional cable routing.

It is possible to improve the riding characteristics of these kinds of pedelecs so customers can feel safe without shimmying. The safer these riders are, the fewer accidents they will have.

In addition, the durability of a low step-through pedelec can become comparable to that of a mountain bike that is made to endure hard use.

Only then will these kinds of pedelecs be able to cope with the increased strain of a heavy motor, heavy loads and heavy cyclists on a permanent basis.



The toolkit case is made of aluminum and plastic, "so it's light and easy to move like a trolley. It comes with a practical assortment of professional bike tools in three drawers," said Marcus Lee, manager of Super B's marketing and sales department. "It is in our eyes the best tool case for traveling."

The bike holder won a d&i award at this year's Taipei Cycle Show. With its special structure and center of gravity design "it needs just one step to fold and

saves more space," Super B's Eric Chen said. Hangers and elastic bungee cords safely accommodate all kinds of gear. "The universal hangers are for gloves, jersey and other cycling items. With this flexible bike holder in your apartment you have all of your bicycle gear on hand," Chen said.

A shock-absorbing material protects the bike and wall from scratches.

in-house research and development team. From initial designs to tooling to production, everything is done at the company's headquarters in Changhua, Taiwan.

Sales manager Tina Hsu said 80 percent of production is for the Super B brand and the rest is for its OEM business.

The company's Lily Ding said JD let its existing bicycle parts range fall by the wayside as it pushed its TranzX line of e-bike motors and components.

"That's what we want to change with a range of innovative parts we are introducing at Eurobike," said Ding, who is vice general manager of JD and responsible for sales and

"It took a while before we were ready. But if you want to stay in the first row and increase market share, you have to present some innovative

The TranzX parts STAND **A6-204** range, on display at its booth, includes a new line of dropper seat posts with remote controls for mountain bikes.

TranzX is also launching a new antishock stem and seatpost for road

Its new Ouick Park Stem. the company says, lets bike riders quickly rotate their handlebars by 90 degrees for convenient storage.

JD is pushing its TranzX products for the aftermarket but is also seeking OEM customers.

"All of these new parts are ideal for OEM customers," Ding said.

More high-end parts are in the pipeline, she added. JD plans to create products for "excellent ergonomics and comfortable rides."

JD's recent focus on e-bike systems helped it create an international awareness for its TranzX brand, Ding said. The company hopes to build on that with its new line of accessories.

Q&A: Dutch retailers

Show diehards say Eurobike lets them jump on trends

Eurobike mainly attracts retailers from the German-speaking market, but many Dutch IBDs make the trip to Friedrichshafen to see the trends with their own eyes.



Roh van der Wa

This trio — Hans and Rik de Bruin and Rob van der Wal — are die hard Eurobike regulars. On the eve of this year's Eurobike, the *Show Daily*'s Arnauld Hackmann asked them why they keep coming to Friedrichshafen, and what they look for.

Father Hans and son Rik de Bruin own Gek van Fietsen ("Crazy About Bicycles") in Alphen a/d Rijn, in the western part of the Netherlands. From their 500-square-meter (5,380-square-foot) shop they sell brands including Flyer, Koga, Gazelle, Giant and Van Nicholas

Rob van der Wal owns De Pedaleur ("The Pedalist") in Doetinchem, close to the German border in the east. Van der Wal focuses on sportive and e-bikes. From a spacious 1,900-square-meter (20,450-square-foot) location, van der Wal sells brands including Batavus, Cannondale, BMC, Specialized and Koga.

ESD: Why do you think, as Dutch bike shop owners, it is important to visit Eurobike?

Rob van der Wal: I want to be updated on what is happening in our industry. I also like to be informed about the brands we don't sell in our store. After Eurobike we determine which brands we will add to our collection for the upcoming season.

Hans and Rik de Bruin: At Eurobike you get the first overview of new trends

in cycling, including sporty e-bikes, accessories and spare parts. We also get a broader perspective on the international market, because you can see much more than what's happening at the time on a national level. We believe that you can get there, for your own company, a good vision of the near future and probably have an advantage over your competitors.

ESD: Do you come to Eurobike by yourselves or with colleagues?

Van der Wal: Usually with a colleague; it's very cozy, but also useful. During our visit and during the trip we always have very valuable discussions.

De Bruins: We visit Eurobike preferably together. You're both focused on different things and you can also see a lot more together. In addition, you can discuss new products with each other and talk about what you see there. By going together you can pick up more from your visit to the fair.


ESD: Where are you going to look for specifically this year?

Van der Wal: Developments of disc brakes on racing bikes and developments in clothing appeal to me. Beside that we are very interested in dynamic measurement systems. It is understandable, but I do regret that a number of reputable bike brands will not be present at Eurobike.

De Bruins: We see that the market is changing rapidly and it is important to respond early to new trends. For us, it is therefore very important to be aware from the beginning, so that we can play in these trends properly. We also expect a lot of news about e-bikes, certainly from the major players in the bicycle industry but also from the electronics business. We really hope to encounter new products that complement our store and our customers and that we can promote and sell exclusively in our region.

2015 Tires: E-bike and everyday tires

Tires for regular cyclists get the job done without all the hype

When tire makers announce their latest pavement-gripping, dirt-ripping innovations, they're usually talking about tires that are intended for racers, or those who wish they were.

But for everyday commuters, city riders, e-bike owners and other "regular" cyclists, there are also plenty of interesting new tires to see here at Eurobike — even if they don't arrive accompanied by the same intensity of breathless marketing. Some models will even spiff up the look of a vintage bicycle.

Heavy duty. E-bikes are an important and fast-growing category in the bicycle industry. In some markets, e-bike sales have kept retailers afloat in a soft economy.

But e-bikes present certain challenges to tire makers. Not only are e-bikes substantially heavier than conventional bikes, but they travel at higher average speeds and cover longer distances

This is even more true with so-called speed pedelecs, which boast motors that can crank out 500 watts instead of the 250 watts on a typical pedelec, and reach a top speed of 45 kmh (28 mph) instead of 25 kph (15.5 mph).

These increased demands required

the industry to establish a new norm. It's called the ECE-R 75 standard, and it covers e-bikes that reach speeds of up to 50 kmh (31 mph). Of course, a tire that carries this certification will easily fulfill the demands of slower e-bikes as well.

Many new tires on display at Eurobike comply with the ECE-R 75 standard.

If going fast is your top priority,

Schwalbe's Durano-E is a logical choice. Available with both steel and Kevlar beads, this tire comes with a ru

Because removing

this tire comes with a rubber compound that offers plenty of grip in the wet. Schwalbe adds reflective stripes on the sidewalls to ensure the rider is visible in dark or wet conditions as well.

an e-bike wheel can be quite a hassle, the Durano-E comes with additional puncture protection. Apart from various widths for 29-inch wheels, Schwalbe also offers the Durano-E in a 40-584 dimension that fits 27.5-inch wheels.



Onza Tires worked with a well-known Swiss manufacturer of speed pedelecs when it developed its Allegra Zai tires. While these also exist in narrow versions with widths of 32mm and

35mm, the bigger news — literally — is Onza's 29x2.25-inch version.

This wide tire offers an extra bit of vibration damping, comfort and control without the additional weight and maintenance usually associated with suspension forks or suspension seat posts.

Another new tire for e-bikes that is worth looking at is Vee Tire's Zilent. It uses Pitch Variation Technology, already proven for automobile tires, to create a quieter tire.

Growing up. The migration from 26-inch to 27.5-inch wheels is roiling the commuter and urban bicycle segment as well as the mountain bike category, and tire manufacturers have to follow suit.

Schwalbe had a limited selection of tires last year that matched the ETRTO size 584, or 650B. It's expanding that selection for 2015.

Kenda is showing its Kwick Seven.5 at Eurobike. Featuring reflective sidewalls and some extra



puncture protection thanks to a K-Shield layer in its carcass, this tire is certified for use on slower e-bikes with a speed limit of 25 kmh as well.

There should be quite a few tires on display here at the show in the new sizes.

Retro rollers. The retro look is back in style, as a stroll through the Eurobike halls will confirm

Sporting classic frames, carriers, fenders, and chainguards painted to match the frames, many of these bicycles

combine retro looks with state-of-the-art technology.

These bikes require a certain kind of tire that won't ruin their carefully created retro appearance. The Schwalbe Century is one such tire.

Built with a 50 TPI carcass and featuring K-Guard puncture protection, this Century comes in four color combinations, from all black with white lettering to a flashy green with skinwall sidewalls.

The design highlight of the Century line is what Schwalbe calls "billboard sidewalls": The lettering is raised and printed with a contrasting color for a three-dimensional effect.

For very classic vintage bicycles, the black and beige skinwall version is an obvious choice.

These kinds of cost-conscious products

don't make a lot of headlines, but they do make a lot of money for retailers.

A lot of cutting-edge tire technologies have trickled down to entry-level tires, so many offer a great value.

Schwalbe's new Range Cruiser is a good example. With its fast-rolling center tread and some added bite on the shoulders, this latest addition to Schwalbe's Active Line is a true allrounder.

The 50 TPI carcass has been reinforced with K-Guard for additional puncture protection, and reflective stripes enhance

2015 E-bikes: Smartphone integration

With smartphones getting ever smarter, e-bike brands are putting them in control

In 1990 there were about 12.4 million mobile phone subscribers worldwide. Today, an estimated 1.75 billion people use smartphones alone. At Eurobike, a host of electric bike companies are tapping into the capabilities of smartphones to make their bikes smarter and their customers happier.



Some e-bike brands believe the convergence of smartphones and e-bikes is inevitable

"The smartphone is actually a perfect smart interface between the bike and

a new generation of smart electronics," said Marko Matenda, CEO of Visiobike, a new, light

e-bike that was designed from the ground

"For example," he added, "Visiobike features torque, light and movement sensors for a level of automatic operation not seen before, with settings and controls all accessible on the user's own smartphone."

On the Visiobike, the rider mounts a smartphone on the bike in lieu of a traditional e-bike display.

Other more established companies are also launching smartphone-compatible displays. including **Bosch**, the European market leader in electric bike drives.

By using a separate display, the rider can stow her smartphone snugly and safely in a pocket or bag. The e-bike's display can communicate with the phone through a Bluetooth link and show notifications such as incoming calls and text messages.

The disadvantage is that a cyclist now to carry two pieces of equipment, not




computer. The Nvon includes a handlebar-A6-203 mounted, 4.3-inch color display that can be controlled wirelessly by a separate thumb-push button next to the grip.

Its myriad functions include wireless Bluetooth connectivity with the rider's smartphone. SMS texts, phone calls and track information from the phone's music player will display on the Nyon's screen.

An integrated GPS function adds real-time 2D and 3D navigation. The Nyon also includes the usual fitness and power controls, which are much enhanced from typical e-bike displays.







The Nyon unit also will link to the Bosch's forthcoming website.

Nyon will be available only as an option for Bosch's higher-end Performance Line systems. Bosch's traditional, non-smartphone-compatible Intuvia display will remain as standard equipment on its systems.

Bosch says Nyon-equipped bikes should hit shops in September. KTM is one large manufacturer that has been quick to adopt the Nyon system for its premium bike range, branded GPS+.

In a similar vein to Bosch, the Swiss firm **Stromer** has announced a smartphone-connected system that will allow riders to fine-tune the performance parameters on its new ST2, a 45 kmh (28 mph) speed pedelec. The system will also use the smartphone to download and install firmware updates.

While some bike settings can be controlled by both the e-bike display and a smartphone, the smartphone also can be used to electronically lock the bike, and track it by GPS in case of theft or loss.

The rider's info is available in Stromer's Cloud-based Omni platform.

Anja Schmidt-Amelung, Stromer's marketing manager, said the ST2's target customers are "technology and design enthusiasts aged 40 to 60." She said Stromer is marketing the ST2 as "the perfect urban commuter's bike."

GO SwissDrive has made electric drive systems for such brands such as Cube, Ansmann and Gobax. Now it is launching a new color display for its motor system that features Bluetooth smartphone connectivity. Its rear wheel hub motor is found primarily on sporty, fast S pedelecs.

"Instances from other sectors indicate that style-conscious, technophile customer groups are specifically looking for value-added features with the potential to satisfy their desire to stand out from the crowd," said Immanuel Seeger, the company's product manager.

That's just what GO SwissDrive says its powerful, silent motor and its slim, Evo color display can offer.

The company's smartphone app should be available when it launches the Evo display, probably in November. The company plans to integrate fitness and navigation functions in the future.

What about e-bike brands that have opted to make the rider's smartphone the main display?

Visiobike has based its 21kg (46 lb.) carbon fiber bike around smartphone functionality, along with its own onboard electronics.

Built-in GPS functions means users can access navigation with Google maps. It also incorporates a host of "smart" anti-theft features that keep the rider in contact with the bike, even when they are not physically present.

Visiobike comes with a rear-view camera that provides a wireless video feed to the smartphone. The company is experimenting with Google Glass so that it can transmit some of the bike's display information right before your eyes.

"We are trying to put the technology on the bike that makes the most sense," Matenda said. "For example, the rear-view video and automatic accident notification features are safety enhancements, while the on-board smart electronics, combined with the Nuvinci H Sync continuously variable gears, means Visiobike can automatically provide the most appropriate assistance level when you come to a hill."

offers a smartphone

Neo and Easy Go lines. BH gives the rider the option to replace the bike's display completely, by using Bluetooth modules that are sold separately.

Among other features, the BH smartphone app has an automatic power control option that is regulated in part by the phone's GPS function. It can also be linked to the rider's heart rate monitor, so the bike can adjust the level of power assist to maintain the rider's heartbeat at a pre-set level.

Czech e-bike brand **Agogs** is also introducing an option to connect a smartphone to the bike's controller.

"Our Bluetooth-enabled controller allows the user to choose between the standard LCD display or their smartphone," said Jakub Ditrich, Agogs' managing director.

He added, "For those who might be reluctant to attach their smartphone to a bike, we have a range of very protective waterproof cases. This means that the Agogs Bike Control app can be used while cycling to manage the assistance levels of the bike and get lots of display feedback from the controller — speed, motor

power, battery level and so on."

Agogs is working to integrate its system with Teasi GPS devices, so the GPS unit could control the bike.

Perhaps most reassuring for potential buyers, Agogs intends to keep its prices within a relatively modest range of €1,100 to €1,900 (\$1,460 to \$2,525).

smartphone software developed by Italy's Sitael, will be used on some models from Hero Eco's A2B brand. ESOCIALBIKE STAND

Along with GPS route planning, the system collects diagnostic and maintenance information directly from a chip in the bike's battery compartment.

"A2B owners stay on top of their bike maintenance with warranty notifications and the ability to report issues, giving dealers direct dialogue with their customers," the company says.

Sitael also says the highly adaptable system can be useful for configuring e-bike fleets.

With so many brands leading the way, it may be just a matter of time before the major e-bike brands wise up and make e-bikes that are smart enough to talk to their users' smartphones. Richard Peace

Rennrad's line of children's bikes grows up under Ming

Ming Cycle is one of Taiwan's top five OEM bicycle producers, and it's getting bigger. The company is building a new factory in Changzhou, China, about 180km (112 miles) northwest of Shanghai.



The company's presence at Eurobike is also getting bigger. For the first time, Ming is showing two brands instead of just one. It's also showing an expanded range of pedelecs for OEM customers.

The first brand in the hands of the Taiwanese producer is Strida. Ming bought the unique folding bike brand, which was created by British bike designer Mark Sanders, in 2007.

"Strida is a sales success, especially on the Asian market," sales manager Sara Tseng said.

But European sales are not as strong, which is why Ming doesn't put Strida in the spotlight at Eurobike.

Much more important for the European market as well as what the company's CEO, Albert Chen, refers to as the "prospering Chinese market," is a new brand: Rennrad

"The Rennrad brand will continue to concentrate on kids from eight to 12 vears." Chen said.

Wood is good for Basque Country custom framemaker

Where most manufacturers and exhibitors have long lead-in and preparation times, things are a little different over at the Axalko stand. There you'll find Joachim Delp enthusiastically exhibiting two very eye-catching bikes with wooden frames.

Less than two weeks ago Delp unexpectedly stumbled upon an Axalko wooden framed bike. "I saw it, and it was so beautiful and I just had to have it." he said.

The frames have been around for nearly three years, and are produced as something of a passionate hobby by a small co-operative.

Two brothers and two friends form the fab four behind Axalko. One, an architect, is the frame designer. The second, a carpenter, is head technician. A third is a skilled bike mechanic, making for a great line-up. They produce the bikes from their home in the Basque Country of northern Spain.

Delp, a German native, has lived in the region for 35 years.

Anyone who passes by the stand can't help but pause for a moment or two, as the two frames – a road and a hardtail mountain bike — are works of art. But even better, it turns out, they're extremely functional.

It's easy to assume that a wooden bike is something of a novelty, and a heavy one at that.

"I have a little game I play with people," Delp said. "They guess the weight before lifting the bike." Most guesses pitch in at around 10 to 12kg (22 to 26

lbs), yet the Dura-Ace equipped road model tips the scales at just 7.4kg (16.3 lbs), thanks to its laminated, layered, hollow ash tubing system.

As for the ride?

"There have been a few former Euskatel riders testing the bikes for us. One actually rode the Paris-Roubaix Sportif on one, and was really impressed," Delp said. "He said that it was a very comfortable ride, and he was confident that the frame could easily compete in any grand tour or classic."

Axalko offers three sizes of road frames, with mountain bikes in the works, although any custom option is available.

"We can do whatever the customer wants, within reason. Lead-in time is usually 16 weeks, although we can do things much faster if needed," Delp said.

Because this was a last-minute project, Delp has not settled on prices, but estimated that a frameset made from ash would cost between €3,000 and €3,500 (\$3,955 to \$4,615).

Wooden and wonderful

Bkool's cool trainer turns any landscape into 3D

What's Spanish for "ultra-realistic online-based global cycle trainer landscapes"? Don't fire up Google Translate: It's "Bkool." The five-year-old Madrid technology firm is at the Orbea stand, debuting its 3D World Internet-based cycle training and ride simulation system.



Bkool's Clara Pastor take a simulated 3D spin.

Feed in the GPS coordinates for anywhere in the planet, and Bkool's software will recreate the route in a 3D-style immersive simulation.

Indoor cyclists can follow the route using real-world geographic data, including slopes and the general lay of the land. The simulator also reproduces rivers, trees and rocks common to an area. (But there are no potholes, so it's not *that* real.)

3D World is in addition to Bkool's existing cycle training system, which uses real-time videos of top climbs around the world. Coverage is most comprehensive for the mountains of Spain.

The stable, quiet training unit transmits sensations from along the route to the user, who bolts in his or her own bike. 3D World has created avatar riders – users can switch from male to female avatars. 3D World also includes a simulated velodrome, with the ability to chase – and, hopefully, overtake – computer avatars or

real-world riders.

In both the map view and the velodrome view, riders can "draft" other cyclists, with the training unit simulating the slackening off sensation of tucking in behind another rider.

All activity on Bkool is recorded in the cloud, so users can incorporate past avatars into competitions, and compete against them in the present.

The simulator allows the user to train with friends (or rivals) at the same time on different continents. The system requires online access – obviously – and the graphics can be thrown on to computer screens, TVs, iPads and smartphones.

Bkool already boasts a powerful analytical suite that informs the user of activity in real time, including heart rate and speed. There's also a cadence analyzer.

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New Hyundai technology stamps out boring steel frames

Everyone is familiar with monocoque carbon bicycle frames — but monocoque steel frames? Hyundai, the big Korean automaker, is promoting a technology that allows bicycle makers to automatically "stamp" out these steel frames in any number of shapes.

Karlheinz "Kalle" Nicolai, the German high volumes, Nicolai bicvcle engineer, was impressed enough with the technology that he is handling distribution and support for the system, called ESV production technology.

"When Hyundai showed me what in my eyes is a revolutionary technology, I was amazed," Nicolai said yesterday. "It's probably the first frame that looks like carbon, without any carbon fiber. Stamping frame technology will definitely bring us to a higher level of frame design and performance."

The patented process comes out of the automobile industry and marries an advanced metal stamping process with a robotic automated welding system.

Nicolai said the steel frames made through the process are comparable in weight to aluminum frames. It's also efficient.

"A large amount of frames can be produced within a very short time," Nicolai said.

Although the process is suitable for

said the frames aren't typical of mass-produced bicycles.

'I was amazed by the quality," he said. "These stamped steel frames bear no relation to the dull image of a heavy steel frame."

It's all about "high-class surface design, perfect quality control and top productivity" - all features of Hyundai's automobile production, said Choi Jung Nam, a research engineer with Hyundai's automotive R&D division

At this year's Geneva Auto Show, Hyundai showed a pedelec under the Kia brand that sported a frame made with the

Brakeforce One is a small German disc brake manufacturer but has long-time connections to the automobile industry.

Despite high manufacturing costs in Germany, Brakeforce One has managed to compete in a market dominated by large suppliers. Officials said their secret is specializing in a highly technical product, combined with well-established business connections within the automobile industry.

"The company is particularly strong because we are able not only to do all R&D by ourselves, but also to manufacture prototypes and do all required tests on our premises," said Peter Voitl, one of the managers of Brakeforce One.

Voitl, who is responsible for frame R&D and prototyping, was the founder of Votec, the German bicycle company. His parther, Jakob Lauhoff, is in charge of disc brake R&D.

Brakeforce One designed and patented its own disc brake system. It produces calipers and disc rotors in Germany in collaboration with Sauter, which supplies components to the automobile industry.

In addition to disc brakes,

Nore power (meters) to the people

Only the pros, or cyclists who have something to lose if they're not riding well, have really embraced the practice of training with a power meter.

And it's no wonder. With the cost of some systems running as high as €4,000 (\$5,275), riders tend to be serious if they're going to make that kind of investment.

Now, power meter companies are attempting to broaden their customer base by offering power meters

Stages Cycling was arguably the first company to pioneer the idea of a more attainable STAGES STAND power meter, with its sub €1,000 A5-202 (\$1,300) single-sided crank unit. Founded in Boulder, Colorado, in 2012, Stages has grown quickly and is at

Stages Dura-Ace meter on output from

Eurobike for the first time. It opened a European office in Kirchzarten, Germany, in December.

The Stages units measures power based the non-drive

side crank, compared with other products that measure from the pedals, the wheels or both crank arms.

"We launched a product that holds water with regards to training and is as useful as any other power meter on the market," Stages spokesman Matt Pacocha said yesterday.

Stages was also the first to track cadence with an accelerometer instead of magnets. Its units automatically compensate for temperature

Stages is priced at €699 to €899 (\$920 to \$1,185), depending on the level of crankset. It offers power meters for Shimano, SRAM, Cannondale and FSA road, mountain bike, track and BMX setups.

New at Eurobike is its power meter for Shimano's Dura-Ace 9000 XTR mountain group and for the new 5800 105 road group, as well as FSA's 386 Evo crankset. Those systems should ship in January.

Next door to Stages, the Garmin booth was swarming with visitors vesterday, with plenty clamoring for a look at the new Vector S pedal-based power meter. The \$900 (\$1,185)

the same approach with its Power LT model, which retails for €990 (\$1,305), compared with its €1,660 (\$2,110) Power version. The LT samples data from the non-drive side only

It still pinpoints a rider's weaknesses, which is usually the point of using a power meter. but it uses an average to calculate watts as opposed to the precise accuracy of taking data from both crank arms, the company's Wendy Booher said.

Another option comes from Taiwanese WELLGO STAND pedal giant Wellgo, a newcomer to the **B2-502** power meter category. The \$1,100 (€835) Thrust E measures speed, distance, heart rate, cadence and watts through transmissions from both pedals. Like most systems, it's ANT+ compatible. The Thrust E is prominently displayed at the Wellgo booth.

Quarq also debuted its latest mountain bike power meter, a \$1,500 (€1,140) system that's compatible with SRAM's one-by drivetrains. ■ **NF**










New chain hotels will ease Eurobike's battle of the beds

Finding beds at the world's biggest bike show will be slightly easier next year. Holiday Inn Express is to open a 120-bed hotel a brisk five-minute walk from the west entrance to the Messe. This is in addition to the 142-bed Comfort Hotel which opened last November, only 4km (2.5 miles) from the show.

"Every new hotel is welcome here," Sandra Scheider of the Messe Friedrichshafen hotel reservation service said yesterday. Added colleague Julia Graf, "We have to book some visitors in accommodations 50 or 60 kilometers away."

The Friedrichshafen hotel booking service comes to life every November and has to find accommodations — in Germany,

Austria and Switzerland — for many of the 45,000 trade visitors to the show, 56 percent of which are from overseas. Eurobike is Friedrichshafen's biggest gig of the year, and with just 4,968 "overnight stays" in town, including private apartments, it's fiendishly difficult to secure accommodation close to the show.

The five-story Holiday Inn Express is expected to open in January.


From its location on Allmannsweilerstrasse is a traffic-light bike and walking path to the Messe that goes through an apple orchard.

Leonard tracked down at least a dozen of the men who infamously finished last in the Tour de France, thus earning the moniker of "lanterne rouge," named after the red lantern at the rear of a train.

"When you first tell someone about the Lanterne Rouge, they think it's about losers. But all these guys understood that it wasn't my angle," Leonard said. "I wasn't trying to make a joke. It wasn't about failure. It was about how tough the race was."

His subjects — who Leonard said were gracious and happy to talk about their exploits — were often domestiques, laboring out of the limelight so their more famous and talented

teammates could claim the glory.

"They were in the elite even to be selected for the Tour de France but they all knew they were never a contender," Leonard said.

Among the lanterne rouge "winners" Leonard interviewed was Wim Vansevenant, who claimed the title three years in a row, the last time in 2008.

"He knew he was a good, valuable team rider. He could work really hard and sacrifice his own chances and own ambitions for his team. And that's what you need to have a successful team," Leonard said.

Lanterne Rouge, published by Yellow Jersey in the UK in April, has been well-reviewed in leading publications. A U.S. edition from Pegasus Books will be published next spring

Carlton Reid's book, *Roads*Were Not Made for Cars, has had a very public birth.


Reid raised money for the book on the crowdsourcing site Kickstarter and has diligently updated supporters on the book's progress since.

After four years of research, Reid is publishing *Roads Were Not Made for Cars* next month. He is self-publishing the book in print and digital editions.

While poring through archives, Reid discovered that the first automobiles were invented by cycling aficionados — using bicycle parts. And

cyclists, not motorists, were the impetus behind the first paved roads.

"All of these motoring pioneers, almost without exception, started not just as people who rode bikes recreationally, they were



key officials in cycling organizations. They were key in improving roads as well," Reid said.

"It's cyclists who created motoring," he added. "If it hadn't been for cyclists, we wouldn't have cars. They were the ones who took cycling-based technology and turned it into cars."

Reid went on Kickstarter to raise 5,000 British pounds (€6,290). He reached that in 23 hours, and raised a total of 17,000 pounds (€21,390).

Taiwan puts its best foot forward on Eurobike stage

Just like the European market it supplies, Taiwan's bicycle industry is looking forward to an improved 2014 after last year's setbacks.

"2013 was not a good year," Anthony Lo, chairman of the Taiwan Bicycle Exporters' Association, told journalists yesterday at Eurobike. "2014 looks like a promising year."

Europe is key for Taiwan's bicycle industry because 51 percent of the island nation's total exports of bicycles (1.9 million units) and components, valued at US\$730 million (€554 million), goes to Europe.

Shipments to the region dropped 15 percent last year due to the well-publicized weather issues that afflicted the European industry.

Nevertheless, the value of Taiwan's global sales rose to US \$1.7 billion (€1.3 billion), and Lo said 2014 is on track for an increase.

"Just look at this bustling trade show," he said.

Lo said he sees new business opportunities, seizing the chance to talk about Giant's women's-specific Liv brand. (Lo is also CEO of Giant.)

"Women are moving more and more to sports bikes. It's time now to develop sports bikes specifically for women. This is a new beginning," he said.

Leading Taiwanese makers also showed new products as yesterday's press conference.

Giant showed two bikes: the Giant Defy Advanced SL, an endurance road bike with what Giant says is its lightest and stiffest road frame ever produced,

and the Liv Avail.

Kenda presented the Honey Badger DH Pro, with a new sidewall pattern made to work with puncture protective casing materials, reducing the chance of sidewall punctures, abrasions and tears.

Taya showed its bicycle chains for e-bikes. The company said its proprietary DHT hardness treatment creates chains that are 25 percent harder than others in the market and last for more than 5,000km (3,100 miles).

Holux focused on its Smart GPS for outdoor use that measures speed, distance, altitude and other attributes on a display that is readable in sunlight. It also showed the Wearable Lifestyle WRL-8100 smartwatch, a device with several fitness features.

Tern, the three-year-old folding bikemaker with a strong presence in the EU, showed its "Bikes with Benefits," which it says improve urban transportation. Among the models were its range of Verge bikes and the new Eclipse Uno.



The men/women divide is the obvious one; but then there are three different ranges within Bioaktive: performance, recreational and city. These are based on how upright riders are on their bikes, and provide corresponding widths and levels of padding for the best experience — narrow and thin for Performance, up to wide and heavily padded for City. Each style is also available in large or small, further adding to the padding options.

The Biofoam gel finish is for 2015 more lightweight and yet more resistant. The Fusion category features a mix of different cover materials while the Gel category has special inserts to protect the most sensitive areas. For those choosing the Recreational saddle, there's also the Open, with a cutout that provides relief to the perineal area.

"We sell a lot of these saddles OEM, and in the north countries – Benelux and Germany," Mazzoleni said. With the revamped design, it's clear that Bioaktive is heading for the lucrative aftermarket too.



Riding & Dining after the show

Roland Hecht's excellent adventure



Today's final post-show recommendation is based on a 402km ride Roland Hecht accomplished earlier this month. So it is possible — although Hecht suggests that Eurobike visitors not take his proposal too seriously.

Hecht acknowledged that riding 402km (249 miles) in one day "isn't a small thing." It grew out of a quest by the FkU chairman to discover how many kilometers a typical non-professional road enthusiast could accomplish in one go.

Hecht's ride has a precedent in the club. Once a year, the FkU organizes a one-day ride that is typically 250km to 300km (155 miles to 186 miles). The ride traditionally happens on the longest day of the year, so it's known as the *Sonnwend*, or "solstice," tour.

Club members work toward this annual "mega tour," and club leaders work to encourage as many members to participate as possible.

For Hecht, the downside is that the

solstice tours are pre-planned. "We have to do the overnight bookings in advance and therefore know already exactly how many kilometers we are about to ride," he said.

Hecht set a different challenge for himself: How many kilometers could he ride in one day? Or, as he put it, "How far can I go nonstop by bike before my body and soul reach the limit?"

Now he knows. Hecht rode the 402 kilometers in about 16 hours. His ride forms the basis of today's recommendation, starting, as always, at the Messe Friedrichshafen lake.

The route goes north to Ravensburg, Bad Schussenried, Laupheim, Ulm, Günzburg and Ellwangen. Then, it just keeps going: Crailsheim, the ancient town of Rothenburg ob der Tauber, Marktheidenfeld and finally (for Hecht, at least), Lohr am Main.

The ride included an altitude change of more than 3,000 meters. The going gets particularly tough in the Spessart, a German mountain range.

"Every five kilometers you have to climb from one stream valley to another. It kills you," Hecht said. "This was the end of my tour. After approximately 16 hours my body and soul said 'no more.'"

Hecht apologized that the "dining" portion of this report is limited. By the time he reached the end he was too late

for dinner at the Seehotel Gut Dürnhof in Rieneck, where he stopped for the night.

"What I can confirm personally is that the local beer there was great. It's called 'Schlappeseppel.' And the breakfast next morning was a dream!" he said.

A 400km ride has one advantage for Eurobike visitors.

"You can save the cost of an paying for an overnight stay at inflated show prices. One thing is sure — This area is far from where the Eurobike visitors stay."

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














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
